

She says she has always dreamed of being Indian Princess and hopes to inspire the younger generation and show that they can achieve anything they put their minds to.



Chevine Holloway is a 19 year old hoop dancer from the Stoney Nakoda First Nation. As the granddaughter of former tipi owners Eddie and Elise Holloway and the daughter of current tipi owner, Marilyn Holloway, Chevine says the Calgary Stampede has played a big role in her life. She points to Indian Village as the place where she took her first steps as a child and where she first started hoop dancing. Chevine feels honored that she has the opportunity to share her First Nations culture with visitors every year at the Calgary Stampede Indian Village.

Chevine has a love for traditional beading and arts which has guided her towards graduating High School and attending Alberta College of Arts and Design. She aspires to be Indian Princess to share the traditions of her late grandmother, who once said that she is a great role model and can share her passion and childhood stories of the Calgary Stampede with others.



Tricia Young is a 22 year old from the Stoney Nakoda Nation, also known as Mini'Thni. Tricia is a Jingle Dress dancer and one of the founders of Nakoda Youth Council.

Tricia describes herself as having a big heart and a love for helping youth. She was recently one of seven people from Stoney Nakoda First Nation to attend the Permanent United Nations forum on Indigenous Issues in New York. Tricia's love for working in the community is one of the key reasons why she is running for Indian Princess. She spends majority of her free time working in the community and organizing events in hopes of reaching her goal of becoming a Councillor and focusing on youth development.



Jasmine Crowchief is a 20 year old Women's Traditional dancer from the Piikani and Siksika Nation. She is currently working toward becoming a large stock Veterinarian.

Jasmine grew up in and around the Calgary Stampede and Indian Village. She has been performing, riding in the daily parades and sharing her culture since just a small child. Jasmine's grandparents, Leo & Maureena Pretty Young Man are current tipi holders. Jasmine makes her own beadwork and regalia and is one of two women to be part the Canadian Indian Relay Team races this year. Jasmine wants to be a positive role model and encourage youth to strive to achieve anything they put their minds to.
