Robert Battle's riveting piece *Strange Humors* was choreographed in 1998 for Parsons Dance Company. His fellow Julliard classmate John Mackey created the contagious blend of African and Middle-Eastern music that Battle describes as a "choreographic argument."

The physically powerful male duet contains influences of tango, Martha Graham and hints of hiphop. After the piece opens with a soft but rich string melody, the music begins to pick-up igniting the male

dancers to come together on the stage performing a fury of high karate-like kicks and sudden falls. Battle said he placed these sudden falls "right in the middle

of the work where people are sort of lulled into it" thus creating a false sense of security of what is going on onstage. This adds excitement to the enticing score as the interpersonal relationship between the two dancers builds.

John Mackey

John Mackey holds a Master of Music degree from the Julliard School and a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from the Cleveland Institute of Music, where he studied with John Corigliano and Donald Erb, respectively.

John has received numerous commissions from the Parsons Dance Company, as well as commissions from the Cleveland Orchestra Youth Orchestra, New York City Ballet's Choreographic Institute, the Dallas Theater Center, the Alvin Ailey Dance Company, the New York Youth Symphony, Ailey II, Concert Artists Guild, Peridance Ensemble, and Jeanne Ruddy Dance, among many others. Recent commissions include works for the American Bandmasters Association, the Dallas Wind Symphony, and a concerto for New York Philharmonic Principal Trombonist Joseph Alessi. As a frequent collaborator, John has worked with a diverse range of artists, from Doug Varone to David Parsons, from Robert Battle to the US Olympic Synchronized Swim Team (The team won a bronze medal in the 2004 Athens Olympics performing to Mackey's score, "Damn.")

John has been recognized with numerous grants and awards from organizations including ASCAP (Concert Music Awards, 1999 through 2008; Morton Gould Young Composer Awards, 2002 and 2003), the American Music Center (Margaret Jory Fairbanks Copying Assistance Grant, 2000, 2002), and the Mary Flagler Cary Charitable Trust (Live Music for Dance commissioning grants, 1998, 1999, 2000, and 2005), and an NEA grant in 2007. He was a CalArts/Alpert Award nominee in 2000.
